TIME TO ENROLL IN THE NEW 4-H YEAR!

How to Enroll:

- 1) Go to https://4h.zsuite.org/
- 2) Existing users—log in using your family's email address & password. New users—create an account.
- 3) From your Family Dashboard, select the family member you want to enroll.
- 4) Click on the blue button, <u>'UPDATE ENROLLMENT'</u>, to initiate the 2021-2022 enrollment process. You will update your contact/personal information, sign the required waivers, & make your club & project selections. Please do not enroll using your junk or spam email address. News & updates about 4-H are communicated primarily by email.
- 5) Submit enrollment & follow up by paying your 4-H dues*. See below for payment process.
- * Complete your enrollment by paying your dues via check, cash, or call us to pay w/ credit card (service fee applies).

4-H CAMP

Idaho 4-H State Teen Association Convention Registration Opens April 12

Idaho 4-H State Teen Association Convention (STAC) registration will open on Tuesday, April 12. Youth who are completing 8—12 grade are eligible to attend the 4-day event in Moscow on June 20-23.

Youth will have the opportunity to participate in a variety of workshops and tours while experiencing life on the University of Idaho campus. A variety of hands-on and interactive workshops are planned, with topics in arts, diversity, natural resources, engineering, animal science, medical science, nutrition, business, marketing, biology, leadership and more. A complete list of workshops will be available at the time of registration.

- Early bird registration (April 12-May 15) is \$270.
- Regular registration (May 16-June 6) is \$295.00.

Registration will be within Z-suites. Scholarships are available, apply in Z-Suites by April 1 to be considered for a scholarship.

LIVESTOCK NEWS

CHIP GILLIAM MEMORIAL PROGRAM

In need of financial assistance for your market project? The Chip Gilliam Memorial Fund is a loan program through the Latah County Fair Office. Since 1997, the loan program has been available to help Latah County youth with financial assistance for their 4-H and FFA market animal projects.

Loan applications are due to the Fair Office March 31, but applications are reviewed on an ongoing basis as funds are available—when in doubt, apply!

Applications are found on the Latah County Fair & Events Center <u>website</u>. Questions can be directed to the Latah County Fair Office at 208-883-5722.

ANIMAL OWNERSHIP

Reminder that as you select animal projects for the year that <u>all animal projects</u>, large livestock and small animals, require ownership and/or providing primary care for a specific number of days.

Plan ahead and make sure you are enrolled, dues paid, <u>and</u> have your animals secured well in advance.

Days of possession are set at the state level. Refer to the **Idaho Project Requirements Handbook** for more information.

- 150 days—Market Beef
- 100 days—Market Swine
- 70 days Market Goat and Market Sheep
- 90 days—Llama/Alpaca, Breeding Beef, Pullets/Laying Hens, Family Flock, Cat, Cavy, Dairy Cattle, Dog, Breeding meat Goat, Dairy Goat, Pack Goat, Pet Goat, Horse, Breeding Rabbit, Pet Rabbit, Breeding Sheep.
- 60 days—Pocket Pet
- 8 weeks-Market Broiler and Market Rabbit

ANIMAL IMPORT REQUIREMENTS

As you confirm plans to purchase your project animals, remember that Idaho State Dept. of Agriculture has import requirements for all livestock entering the state.

This is not new—these rules apply to anyone, including 4-H & FFA youth, who are bringing livestock into the state. An essential part of being a responsible livestock producer is understanding and following these rules. Please review the ISDA Quick Reference on page 8. for species-specific information.

AREA LIVESTOCK FEED PROGRAMS

Remember that many businesses in the area offer programs that support youth livestock members. Ask for details next time you visit these businesses:

- <u>SPENCE HARDWARE</u>—enroll in the market project program to be eligible for discounts and gift certificates. Inquire now so you don't miss account setup deadlines.
- INTERMOUNTAIN FEED—receive 1 free bag of starter feed for your market project when you sign up for their Market Project Program.
- NORTH 40 OUTFITTERS—Youth members are eligible for 10% off regular priced feed and show supplements through the Junior Livestock Feed Program.
- <u>CHS PRIMELAND</u>—ask about their Rate of Gain program.

MARKET LIVESTOCK TAGGING/WEIGH-IN



Mark your calendars now! Tagging dates for Latah County market animal projects can be found below:

- Beef—Saturday, April 16, Monson Barn—UI Campus, 7:00 am—9:30 am.
- **Swine**—Friday, June 3, 2022, Latah County Fairgrounds, 2:00 pm—7:00 pm.

YES, we are <u>weighing and tagging market swine</u> this year. Why? To fulfill the requirement of providing a uniform feeding period for market species, minimize liability to leaders, and to provide a valuable educational opportunity for youth. This decision was reached based on input and support from swine and livestock leaders, ISDA, and guidance from State 4-H office leadership.

Just as it is expected for all beef, goat, and sheep members, this is not optional for 4-H swine members. You are expected to have your animals tagged at this event if you wish to participate in the Latah County Fair. Reminder postcards will be sent regularly.

• Sheep & Goat—Wednesday, July 6, 2022, Latah County Fairgrounds, 4:00 pm—6:30 pm.

4-H members must have paid annual enrollment dues and be 'Active' in ZSuite by their respective species tagging/weigh-in date.

To ensure consistency between programs, members should be prepared to designate their primary project animal and floater as either 4-H or FFA at designated county tagging/ weigh-in events and deadlines. Postcards will be sent out closer to each tagging date with specific costs of vaccines.

HORSE NEWS

HORSE PROJECT

Youth interested in the horse project, enroll now so you do not miss out on opportunities and year-end award eligibility!

In addition to the horse show in July, you are required to participate in at least one county-wide horse activity in order to be eligible for year-end awards.

Opportunities to fulfill this requirement include:

- Horse Judging & Demonstrations (Moscow)—April 9 @ 8:30 am. Registration closed March 31.
- Live Horse Judging in Lewiston—May 14 @ 9:00 am. NOTE: This is the <u>County-Qualifying Contest</u> for judging at the State Horse Contest July 8-9 in Nampa! To register, contact Melinda Cross (Latah & Nez Perce County Horse Leader) at 530-334-0973.

Plan ahead and ENROLL in the Horse project now so we know to expect you! Dues are \$30. Targeted email/mail correspondence to horse members and leaders with important dates, deadlines, and events has started, so be sure you are watching for updates.



Due to Latah County Extension office <u>April 15</u>. Every odd-numbered year, all members are required to turn in new/updated papers on their project animal(s). If you are new to the horse project or are a returning member with a new horse, please submit identification papers!


If your family has multiple horses that you may ride, we <u>strongly</u> encourage turning in identification papers for all horses by the above deadline. Minimum ownership/lease for horses is 90 days, so you need to have all possible project animals owned and identified with our office by April 15.

REMINDERS

Safety Reminder! 4-H members participating in any 4-H equestrian activity must wear an approved helmet whenever they are mounted on an equine or are in a vehicle (cart, wagon, buggy, etc.) being pulled by an equine. An approved helmet meets the minimum performance standards imposed by the American Society for Testing Materials (ASTM) F1163 and includes certification and labeling required by the Safety Equipment Institute (SEI).

PNW 4-H Horse Contest Guide—Idaho uses the PNW 4-H Horse Contest Guide. It is a good idea to review this guide every year so you are familiar with the rules and expectations of participating in 4-H Horse Contests. Hard copies are available at Latah County Extension or you can access it on UI Extension's **website**.

LEADER'S CORNER

LEADER TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES

To maintain leader certification, we recommend 4-H leaders complete 2 hours of continuing education related to 4-H, youth development, or your project area Check out some of the opportunities below:

- Once you are enrolled in ZSuite, check out the Clover Academy (left side of your screen in the black navigation bar). Here you can participate in two online courses:
 - Idaho 4-H Volunteer Orientation Modules a great course required for brand new volunteers, and is available to seasoned volunteers interested in a refresher.
 - Idaho 4-H Protecting Minors Training—a short video required of all new volunteers, and every three years for returning volunteers.
- Stewards of Children—offered through Gritman
 Medical Center. Extension will fully reimburse you
 the cost of the class with proof of attendance.
- If you are taking a training through your employer or other volunteer commitment (such as CPR/First Aid) that you think might apply to your work as a 4-H volunteer, please contact our office about applying it as your annual 4-H training.

MEETING ATTENDENCE

This time of year, our office receives a lot of questions from leaders about club and project meeting attendance. Page 10 of <u>Idaho 4-H Policies and Procedures</u> specifies that members are expected to attend the <u>majority</u> of scheduled club and project meetings.

- Establish your meeting schedule well in advance so members can put dates on their calendars.
- Knowing the total number of meetings in advance helps families plan ahead and assists you as a leader in holding members accountable for their attendance.

Per Policies and Procedures, regular 4-H <u>clubs</u> should meet 6 or more times per year. For <u>project</u> meetings, project leaders can determine the total number of meetings they wish to schedule.

Livestock Import Rules Apply to 4-H and FFA Animals

As you begin selecting animals for your 4-H & FFA projects for the upcoming fair season, please keep in mind that <u>all</u> import rules for livestock apply to animals brought into Idaho that will be used as 4-H and FFA market and breeding animals. Below is a quick reference (as of 2/6/2019) for each species. For a complete listing of import requirements, please go to the ISDA website at:

Cattle:

- > Castrated male cattle (steers) must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) from a licensed veterinarian with a full physical address of the origin and destination.
- > Intact female beef cattle must have a CVI with the full physical address of the origin and destination. Female cattle 4 months and older require vaccination for Brucellosis with their legible tattoo recorded on the CVI. Female cattle 18 months and older require individual, official identification listed on the CVI. Female calves accompanying their dam may enter without vaccination.
- > All intact dairy cattle must have a CVI with the full physical address of the origin and destination and an entry permit.

 Female cattle 4 months and older require vaccination for Brucellosis with their legible tattoo recorded on the CVI. All dairy females 6 months of age and older are required to have a negative Tuberculosis test within 60 days before entering Idaho. Individual, official identification must also be listed on the CVI.
- > Brand Inspections required on all cattle (even if unbranded.) For information on Brand Inspections please call the Idaho State Brand Department Lewiston District Office at 208-799-5019.

Horses:

- > CVI with full physical address of the origin and destination. Six month equine passports are accepted from states participating in Global Vetlink's EECVI program. Negative EIA (Coggins) test required within 12 months prior to entering Idaho.
- > Brand Inspections required on all horses (even if unbranded.) For information on Brand Inspections please call the Idaho State Brand Department Lewiston District Office at 208-799-5019.

Sheep and Goats:

- > Castrated male sheep and goats (wethers) CVI with full physical address of the origin and destination and an entry permit from the Idaho Sheep and Goat Health Board (contact: Brandy Kay at 208-803-5084).
- > Intact female sheep and goats must have a CVI with full physical address of the origin and destination and an entry permit from the Idaho Sheep and Goat Health Board (contact: Brandy Kay at 208-803-5084). Scrapies tag, tattoo (if recorded on Breed Registry papers), or other official, individual identification recorded on CVI.
- > Intact male sheep and goats must have a CVI with full physical address of the origin and destination and an entry permit from the Idaho Sheep and Goat Health Board (contact: Brandy Kay at 208-803-5084). Scrapies tag, tattoo (if recorded on Breed Registry papers), or other official, individual identification recorded on CVI.
- > All dairy type goats over 6 months of age need a negative Brucellosis test within 30 days before entering Idaho.
- > All intact male sheep over 6 months of age must have a negative Brucella ovis test within 30 days before entering Idaho.
- > All sheep and goat CVI's must also state that listed animals are free from Scrapie (known to have not been exposed for at least 72 months prior to date of inspection), Scabies (known to not have been exposed for at least 6 months immediately prior to date of inspection), Foot Rot, Brucella and do not have any symptoms of any communicable diseases (known to have not been exposed to any communicable disease for at least 30 days immediately prior to date of inspection.)

Hogs:

- > All swine entering Idaho require a CVI with the full physical address of the origin and destination and an entry permit.

 Individual, official identification must be listed on the CVI. The following statements must also be on the CVI; Raw Garbage Statement, PRV Statement and a PEDv Statement.
- > All breeding swine not originating from a Brucellosis free herd or a Brucellosis free state must have a negative Brucellosis test within 30 days of movement into Idaho.

Transportation

- For all State and National 4-H Events, the University of Idaho 4-H Youth Development department will arrange public transportation – trains, buses, and/or commercial airlines – to and from events. Because commercial chartered companies are held to higher safety standards with periodic inspections and approved health and safety policies, 4-H requires all youth and chaperones participating in 4-H State and National events to use the transportation arranged for each event. For information, please review the 4-H Transportation Policy.
- Fees for bussing is included in the registration cost. Fees cover the expenses associated
 with all Transportation provided, including, but not limited to: gas; mileage; lodging and
 accommodations for all bus drivers; insurances; and use of buses for events held off
 campus during the event.
- Those living in the Moscow area (Incl. Troy, Deary, Bovill) where a bus is not routed through, may travel to the event following the provisions outlined under the "4-H Traveling in Non-Public Automobiles" section of the 4-H Transportation Policy.

Lodging

Delegates will stay at the University of Idaho Theophilus Tower Dormitory. Delegates need to bring bedding (pillow, sleeping bag and/or sheets, blankets), towels, and personal toiletry items. Rooms and roommates will be pre-assigned. Counties are grouped together by districts on floors. *Changes are not allowed*. There is a \$60 charge for lost room keys and \$5 fee for lost key tags.

Food

Meal service is provided in the EATERY cafeteria. Delegates will be issued a meal card which must be presented at each meal. There is a \$15 charge for replacing lost cards.

Dress Code

Dress for this event ranges from casual to semi-formal.

- Casual for daily activities includes jeans, capris, sweatshirts or t-shirts. Baggy sweats, short-shorts (inseams less than 4")/skirts, and lowcut shirts or tank tops are not permitted under daily casual wear and youth will be asked to change into something more appropriate. No crop-tops (midriffs must be covered)
- Business Casual for officer interviews and speeches (if applicable) Dresses, skirts (knee length or longer when seated), slacks with nice blouses/shirts or sweaters, nice dress jeans (black Wranglers) are allowed but no blue denim. Closed toe shoes, hard-soled.



- Semi-Formal for Clover Banquet Dresses, dressy blouses and skirts (knee-length or longer when seated), or dress pants, shirts and ties. Semi-formal means no denim, bared midriffs and shirttails are tucked in. No flip flops or sport shoes.
- **Sleepwear** is to be worn only in individual rooms, not in public areas (halls, meeting rooms, lobby). Be sure to bring jackets and rain gear as well!

Delegates are expected to adhere to these policies. 4-H Members sign an electronic code of conduct upon enrollment for the 4-H program.

Parents/guardians of Non 4-H members will be required to complete and sign a consent form, which provides for adherence to certain polices and health requirements.

2022 University of Idaho Youth Conference Policies

The University of Idaho 4-H Youth Development department wants your week at State Teen Association Convention to be filled with exciting experiences, new friendships, and fun. To help make this happen, each participant is expected to be considerate of others, participate fully in the Conference programs, and observe the following rules.

Assemblies & Workshops



- Attendance at all scheduled events is required. Be prompt in attendance and courteous to all instructors and speakers.
- Workshops are assigned according to choices given on your registration form and available space.
- Name badges are important for gaining admittance to Idaho 4-H State Teen
 Association Convention events, for identification and to help you get acquainted.
 Wear your badge at all times.

Dormitory & Meals

- Room assignments made at dorm registration must be kept. Counties are grouped together by districts on floors. Changes are not allowed (in an emergency, we must know where you are).
- Leave valuables at home. We have no way to guarantee their security. Even locked dorm rooms do not always prevent losses. (There is a \$60 charge for lost room keys and a \$5 fee for lost key tags.)
- Respect for the privacy of others requires that members of the opposite sex are only allowed in common areas on the same floor. No delegate will be allowed in the rooms of the opposite sex.
- Lounges are available on each floor for visiting.
- Dormitory will be locked one-half hour after the close of the evening activity. In your room and quiet time begins, please refer to the schedule for lights out times. After lights out, use phones for emergencies only.
- The removal of window screens or throwing any object out of the dorm windows is strictly forbidden.
- ALL meals are provided during this conference. <u>Delegates are not permitted to</u>
 <u>order on/off campus dining to be delivered to the dorms during this event</u>. If there
 are mealtime concerns, please contact the event coordinators prior to conference to
 make accommodations.
- At no time should any youth be alone on campus, youth should engage in the "buddy system" when traveling to workshops, activities, meals or other STAC approved events. Youth should not enter any UI buildings except for attending STAC workshops, activities, meals or other STAC approved events.
- Leaving campus at any time during this event is prohibited without prior arrangements made by the event coordinators. This includes traveling to restaurants, stores, malls, etc. or leaving the conference prior to the close of conference for any reason.

General

- Idaho 4-H State Teen Association Convention delegate may ride only in cars driven by Extension staff or chaperones. Only campus or Moscow buildings scheduled for 4-H events are to be entered and then only at times designated on the program.
- Possession of tobacco, vape products, use of alcoholic beverages, illegal drugs, firearms or explosives of any kind is prohibited on campus and anytime during Idaho 4-H State Teen Association Convention.



- Cost of damage or theft of any university property will be billed to the individual responsible (or delegate's parents) or to the group with which the delegate is associated.
- Permission to leave Idaho 4-H State Teen Association Convention and/or campus at any time must be secured in advance from the Extension staff or chaperone in charge of the county delegation who will then inform the 4-H Youth Development Office.
- Minor problems will be handled by the Extension staff or chaperone in charge.

Event Nurse/Health Information

- Report illness immediately to an adult chaperone. Medical staff are available to
 provide immediate First Aid assistance on site. In case of emergency, parents will be
 notified and delegates will be taken to Moscow Family Medicine or Gritman
 Memorial Medical Center, Moscow.
- All medications must be turned into the event nurse upon arrival. This includes
 prescription and over-the-counter medications. In the event of a medical
 emergency, we need to know what medications have and have not been taken.
- Emergency rescue medications such as inhalers and EpiPens do not need to be turned it, but the event staff should be aware that you carry these devices in case assistance needs to be given in an emergency.

Major options include environmental sciences, rangeland conservation, forestry, wildlife resources, fire ecology and management, ecology, conservation biology, forest and sustainable products, and fisheries!

FOOD IS FUEL

We will be sharing hands on tips on nutrition for independent living; using Healthy Living activities such as, Think-Your-Drink and Power up Your Breakfast. Along with how to beef up your top ramen! Fuel is food: get tips on how you can make prepackaged foods healthier!

LEADERSHIP NOW! ADVANCED LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

The Leadership NOW! Advanced Leadership Development workshop will consist of intense face to face leadership development. You will be engrossed in interactive opportunities that will teach them skills that will help them in future leadership positions.



LEAN PROJECT MANAGEMENT

Lean project management principles strive to deliver more benefits and eliminate waste in processes. This workshop will use hands-on activities and reflection time to introduce students to lean project management strategies and discuss how these strategies are used in manufacturing and software development by companies such as Toyota and Microsoft. In addition, students will have the opportunity to apply lean principles to processes they are currently use in their schoolwork, jobs, and other areas in their life. This workshop will be relevant to students who are considering careers in business, manufacturing, or engineering fields, and will have practical benefits for attendees.

MEAT SCIENCE: BACON, BY-PRODUCTS, AND BEYOND!

In this two-part presentation with the U of I meat science team, attendees will gain both practical meat science knowledge, as well as insight to employment opportunities in the protein industry. In part 1, U of I meat scientists will deliver a hands-on workshop exploring the pork industry; everything but the oink! In part 2, students will hear from the American Meat Science Association about collegiate and employment opportunities in the vast field of animal proteins.

PRINTING WITH GELLI PLATES

Students will learn about a form of printmaking, Gelli printing. They will explore the elements and principals of design, such as: color, texture, emphasis, and variety. They will also be able to explore the materials, such as: brayers, Gelli plates, stencils, printmaking ink, and texture tools. By the end of the session they will have an understanding of the elements and principals of design, what printmaking is, printmaking materials, and have one or more finished prints to take home.

SHADING WITH GRAPHITE

Channel your inner artistic talent! This hands-on workshop will provide a basic introduction and practice of the value scale and shading techniques. We will practice using different shading tools and spend time putting our knowledge into practice

SOCIAL MEDIA MARKETING AND BRANDING DESIGN

In this workshop you will learn practical tips and tricks to cultivate an active network across social media platforms. Create your visual brand by learning about the rules and stages of poster and logo design including typography, color, line, contrast, focal points, and thumbnail drafting.

SUSTAINABLE POLYMERS: CONFRONTING THE PLASTIC CRISIS

Plastics are one of the most versatile and useful materials in our everyday lives, but the very properties that make them useful also make them problematic when we dispose of them. Youth participating in this workshop will learn about the properties of different packaging materials, and experience the plastic life cycle through an interactive, hands-on game. We will also explore the emerging field of bioplastics and discuss how youth can transform learning into action in their home communities.

RADIO ADVERTISING STRATEGY AND SALES

What does it take to make the sale in Radio Advertising? In this workshop you will work with local professionals to learn the start to finish process that we use in broadcast advertising from prospecting



clients, developing recommendations, the creative process, and the pitch to local and regional advertisers.

SASHIKO STITCHING

Stitching with a needle and thread is an ancient process that transcends time. This workshop elevates the humble needle and thread to a decorative tool as participants learn about sashiko stitching and visible mending strategies.

THE "OWN IT" PERSONALITY TEST

Have you ever wondered why you mesh with certain people and clash with others? In this workshop, participants complete the "Own It" personality test to help them increase personal clarity. Exercises and acting out real-life situations will make students laugh and help them make the most of their unique personality while effectively relating and leading others. They also learn to respond to "dark personalities" in a positive way to resolve conflict.

VISUAL JOURNALING (6 HOUR TRACK)

Students will learn how to express themselves by creating a mixed media visual journal. They will be able to explore different materials such as, liquid watercolors, illustration markers, colored pencils, and oil pastels. Different techniques will be taught as well- like collage, techniques for each provided material, etc. They will also learn about the elements and principals of design, focusing on: unity, balance, variety, texture, color, and space. The students will have a sketchbook to take home to continue their visual journal journey.

WATER SCIENCE: IDAH2O PHYSICAL/CHEMICAL AND MACROINVERTEBRATES

This hands-on outdoor water science workshop will give participants real-world analysis skills about water quality and habitats. Following the IDAH2O Master Water Steward and the hot-off-the-presses, brand new 4-H Wildlife and Water Curriculum (ECS014), everyone will try out physical/chemical water quality assessments in a local stream. Then we will use nets to catch some water bugs (aquatic macroinvertebrates) and figure out what they are, and what they mean for stream health. It will be fun, informative, and will build real-world science skills.

YOUR LIFE STORY

What makes movies great is conflict, but more importantly how conflict is responded to. Students watch short clips from popular movies, learn from key scenes, and then apply principles to apply as the "director" in their own life. This workshop helps students step outside of themselves and take the lead with their past, present, and future in a fun and enlightening way.
